

Brian Babin is a lifelong resident of East Texas. He was born in Port Arthur, Texas and grew up in Beaumont. He graduated from Lamar University with a Bachelor of

Science and completed dental school at the University of Texas Dental Branch in Houston, Texas.

Dr. Babin served as an airborne artilleryman in the Texas Army National Guard and held various jobs to put himself through school, including merchant seaman, janitor, musician, disc jockey and U.S. Post Office letter carrier. Following his graduation from dental school, Dr. Babin was commissioned as a Captain in the United States Air Force and stationed overseas at Ramstein, Germany.

Dr. Babin returned to East Texas in 1979 and settled in Woodville, where he opened a dental office which he maintained over the past three-plus decades. During that time, Brian also served as Woodville's Mayor, City Councilman, as a Woodville ISD School Board Member and in various other civic roles, including Director and Vice President of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club President.

Since 1999, Dr. Babin served on the Lower Neches Valley Authority, appointed by then-Governor Bush and reappointed by Governor Perry. He also served on the Texas State Historical Commission and the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners. In addition, he served on the Deep East Texas Council of Governments.

Dr. Babin became involved in politics by supporting Ronald Reagan for President in 1980 as the Reagan County Chairman of Tyler County. Since then he has worked to turn what was previously a heavily Democrat region into a Republican area by building a conservative voting base and encouraging and supporting good local candidates to run as Republicans. More recently, Brian served as an organizer and member of the Tyler County Patriots and as a keynote speaker for numerous patriot and veterans' events and rallies throughout East Texas. On January 5, 2015, Dr. Babin was sworn in as a member

of the 114th Congress. He was appointed to two committees that are critically important to the 36th District. His service on the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee affords him the opportunity to address the critical ports, highways, rails and pipelines that provide thousands of jobs and fuel a hub of economic activity that includes more petrochemical refining facilities than any district in the country.

Dr. Babin was also appointed to the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology. Serving as the Ranking Member of the House Subcommittee on Space, he is able to serve as a national leader for America's space policy matters regarding NASA and represent the interests of Johnson Space Center, also located in the district. As a member of the Subcommittee on Environment, Brian has helped lead efforts to bring transparency and accountability to the EPA, which has threatened our petrochemical and agricultural interests with excessive regulation.

Dr. and Mrs. Babin are members of First Baptist Church of Woodville, where he has served as a deacon, Sunday school teacher, choir member and as a member of Gideon's International. He and his wife, Roxanne, also from Beaumont, have been married since 1972 and still reside in Woodville. They have five children and 17 grandchildren.

Making America safe, strong and economically secure for the future of his children and grandchildren — and the children and grandchildren of those he represents remains his reason for running to proudly serve the people of TX-36.

DEI Will Be the Death of Us

Regulations and federal agencies have a large influence on the businesses and the lives of the American people. Since 1964 and the passage of the Civil Rights Act, the institutions of the government have emphasized the importance of equal treatment of the protected groups mentioned in the law. Laws are passed on to the relevant agencies for implementation and enforcement. As they turn the law into regulations and policies, their impact is huge. Our Constitution and Bill of Rights have

emphasized the importance of everyone being equal under the law. In recent years, however, we are seeing new standards and expectations among businesses and other institutions. Equality of opportunity has become equity in results, reversing standards such as hiring the most qualified person. Now it is a priority to have equity, so qualifications and excellence become secondary. The following article from *American Greatness.com* explains the impact of these changes.

Higher education's abject submission to the gods of "diversity, equity, and inclusion" is now assured. Many colleges and universities are building into their hiring, promotion, and tenure schemes *a requirement that candidates show "DEI competencies" in order to advance*. What's more, the rubrics assessing whether a candidate has hit the mark are saturated with the terminology of leftist identity politics. More importantly, they take for granted the central assumptions of modern cultural Marxism and critical race theory.

DEI holds that treating people equally, regardless of race, ethnicity, sex, or sexual orientation, is somehow perverse and wrong. Social justice requires dismantling old "systems of oppression" in the name of "equity"—that is, equal outcomes. If that means discriminating in *favor* of protected classes, and against everyone else, so be it. It's a demented and profoundly un-American point of view.

Admissions quotas, which mainstream Democrats largely abandoned back in the 1990s as voters awakened to how unfair they were, have returned with a vengeance, again in the name of "equity." What's more troubling, though, is not merely that higher education has succumbed to identity politics. Given the ivory tower's increasingly leftist tilt, that was inevitable. Rather, it's the rapid progress DEI is making *outside* of the education establishment.

Corporate America, which was long a bastion of free market conservatism, is now undergoing a fundamental and sweeping cultural shift. Corporate human resources offices, full of recent college graduates, now focus on cajoling hapless employees into taking on the role of "social justice warriors,"

and remolding the corporate workforce to ensure that hiring and promotion decisions are made with an eye to achieving numerical (and generally arbitrary) "equity" goals.

Sadly, the NASDAQ stock exchange, in collusion with the Biden Administration's Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), has recently committed to enforcing these perverse and un-American dogmas by requiring any U.S. company listed on the exchange to have a minimum number of minorities, women, and members of the LGBT community on its board—or else submit to mandatory Maoist self-denunciation.

The simple fact that discrimination on the basis of race, ethnicity, sex, gender identity, or sexual orientation is banned by state and federal law seems not to trouble those pushing such efforts at radical transformation—presumably because they assume (correctly) that the prosecutors and bureaucrats charged with upholding such laws have no interest in protecting the rights of anyone outside the Left's cherished protected classes.

In all likelihood, then, the DEI advocates at NASDAQ will succeed in their effort to embed the twisted logic of cultural Marxism in corporate America, even more deeply than it is now. Companies that cling stubbornly to the principles of nondiscrimination and meritocracy will find themselves delisted, vilified, and excluded from the new, aggressively woke brand of state capitalism that the Left is forging — underwritten, as usual, with public funds.

The stakes are high, and not just for corporations. Conservatives and Republicans should ask themselves: if *every* institution in modern society submits to cultural Marxism and identity politics — from education and entertainment to big business and even mainline Christianity — then what are the long-term prospects of a political movement that dares to dissent from such a pervasive orthodoxy?

If we once thought we could afford to scoff at the woke antics of professors, the looming conquest of the corporate world by the Left should be seen for the grave threat to America that it is. In the battle for corporate America's soul, failure simply cannot be an option.

Update on National Spending Bill

On Wednesday, September 28, the Senate passed a short-term resolution which cleared the way for preventing a government shutdown — current funding ended September 30, 2022.

Passage was ensured when Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia withdrew his provisions to streamline permitting for energy projects as well as approval of a pipeline in West Virginia. This allows the funding for government functions through December 16, 2022.

It comes as no surprise that the bill also included more military and economic aid for Ukraine rather than attention to U.S. border issues.

When Congress reconvenes after the November election, they will face the need for passage of a longer term solution to provide funding for the remaining months of the 2023 budget year.



The Jefferson County Commissioners' Court recently adopted the 2022-2023 County Budget. While we were required by state law to read a statement which said we were *increasing* the "tax rate" at the time of the adoption of the budget, that statement is factually untrue. Despite having made the motion in Commissioners' Court to REDUCE the "tax rate," I was not successful. As a result, we kept the same tax rate as last year (36 cents per \$100 valuation). Because industrial, commercial and **some** residential



valuations went up, Jefferson County will actually collect 7.4% more revenue this year by *keeping the same tax rate as last year.*

Most of you have heard me say that Jefferson County has the 9th lowest tax rate of the 254 counties in Texas, and that is because more than 65% of our ad valorem taxes are paid by business industry.

One might assume that 7.4% more revenue would make available to Jefferson County that much in unallocated revenues. Unfortunately, such is not the case. Just as families are dealing with the effects of inflation relating to gasoline, groceries, utilities, etc., Jefferson County is also dealing with significant inflationary pressures. County Jail clothing costs have increased 47% in the last six months, while County Jail food costs have gone up over 30%. County Jail medical costs have increased by several million dollars and, because of Covid and its impact on jury trials, our average daily population at the Jail has skyrocketed.

The long and short of it is that all additional revenues collected by Jefferson County have been eaten up by inflation and there will be no discretionary funding available for additional projects or initiatives.

On the economic development front, activity has been very brisk and I am anticipating continued significant economic development for the next ten years both through traditional fossil fuel energy projects and through several "green" projects, such as one that will convert wood pulp to gasoline. Golden Pass LNG recently received Federal Energy Regulatory Agency approval to increase their workforce from 440 people to 7,700. At the same time, work continues on several multi-billion dollar projects, including ExxonMobil, Valero and Cheniere Energy. Several other companies are in the engineering, design and permitting phases of multi-billion dollar projects: Sempra Energy and other Fortune 500 firms that I cannot yet name.

We should have a very robust and expanding economic base for the next 20 years — particularly because synergies spawn additional projects — so that our main focus will need to be on having a well-trained and educated workforce. Thankfully, we have Lamar University, LIT, Lamar State College and both union and non-union training programs that provide opportunities to prepare the next generation of workers for very fulfilling and high-paying careers.

Our economy will be further bolstered by our ship channel deepening project, saving area industry millions of dollars per year in avoided lightering operations and making the channel safer for an estimated additional 650 ships per year to be added to channel traffic as a result of the new expansion projects.

While we are currently the *third largest port in the nation by tonnage, I expect we will take over the No. 2 spot fairly quickly.* And, depending on Highway 69/96/287 expansion projects and the impact they will have on waterborne transportation, we should experience even more significant growth.


