Joe's faith has been a pillar in building his business as he has always sought to follow the Golden Rule of treating others the way that we would like to be treated. Texas' 88th Legislative Session

Texas House Republicans Back Keeping Dade Phelan as Chamber's Speaker

AUSTIN — Speaker Dade Phelan on Saturday easily cleared a hurdle long-demanded by the most staunchly conservative members of his party — endorsement by the House Republican Caucus, by secret ballot, of a would-be presiding officer of the chamber. And it was done before Democratic House members get to participate in the speaker election.

Phelan, R-Beaumont, who served as speaker for the first time last year, defeated Arlington GOP Rep. Tony Tinderholt, 78-6.

The vote, taken at a closed-door session held at the Capitol weeks before the formal election of a speaker by all 150 House members on the first day of session, was the first contested speaker-endorsement vote held under a 2017 caucus bylaw change. It allows any Republican member to trigger a pre-session, intra-party vote if he or she desires to be the chamber's next presiding officer.

Phelan, who was just elected to his fifth term in the House, said in a written statement Saturday that he is "deeply grateful" to his Republican colleagues.

"The 88th Texas Legislature will include important debates on issues ranging from property taxes to foster care, and I'm confident that our chamber and our caucus will lead the charge on policy proposals that better the lives of all Texans," said Phelan, 47, a real estate developer. . . .

Republican Caucus Chairman Tom Oliverson of Cypress (TX House District 130 - NW Harris County), a Phelan ally, stressed that the vote, which involved distribution of ballots printed on light blue paper, involved tight security controls.

"It was completely free from influence of any kind," he said. "Members were free to vote their conscience." . . .

On Saturday, Oliverson, the GOP caucus chairman, denied in a written statement that last year's session was a repudiation of conservatism:

During a regular and three special sessions, lawmakers virtually outlawed abortion, allowed permitless carry of handguns and passed a controversial "election security" measure.

Last year's was "one of the most conservative sessions in our Legislature's history," Oliverson said.

COMPILATION OF NEWS FROM Republican Party of Texas - 12/9/2022:

Much is happening in anticipation of January 10, 2023—the opening day of the 88th Texas Legislative Session. November 14, 2022 was the first day bills could officially be filed, and hundreds of bills have already been filed by Republicans and Democrats combined.

The State Republican Executive Committee (SREC) Legislative Priorities Committee is tasked with advocating for bills that advance eight priorities of the Republican Party of Texas that were passed by delegates at the Republican State Convention last June. https://texasgop.org/priorities/

As bills are filed, the SREC Legislative Priorities subcommittees review each bill and identify the ones that match the priority language.

The SREC met in Austin December 9-10, during which the Legislative Priorities Committee was tasked with evaluating and compiling priority bills. They will continue this process throughout the session, as well as encourage and work with legislators to file or amend bills that better reflect RPT priorities. Once approved by the Legislative Priorities Committee, bills will be posted on the <u>Texasgop.org</u> website under "#txlege, LP Bill List."

88th Legislative Session – Overview

The 88th Legislative Session is comprised of 140 days, with various deadlines imposed along the way via constitutional provisions and specific rules found within each legislative chamber. The following is a list of the most important dates/deadlines for Texas taxpayers to be aware of:

Pre-filing Legislation – Begins Monday, November 14

Session Begins:

Day 1 – Tuesday, January 10, 2023: 88th Legislative Session begins

House elects Speaker of the House

House debates Housekeeping & Rules Resolutions

Senate adopts Caucus Report regarding operations of the Senate and temporary rules

- *Committees for each legislative chamber are normally assigned within the first few weeks of the legislative session
- **The Governor normally presents his State of the State address to a joint session of the legislature near early February, where he publicly announces his emergency legislative priorities

Day 61 through Day 118 – Saturday, March 11 – Sunday, May 7, 2023:

Committees begin holding public hearings on legislation moving through the legislative process

The General Appropriations Act (Proposed State Budget for the next biennium) normally gets deliberated in early April.

Day 133 – (By 9:00 a.m.) – Monday, May 22, 2023: Last House local and consent calendar with SBs must be distributed (48-hour layout)

Day 134 – Tuesday, May 23, 2023: Last day for House to consider 2nd reading SBs/SJRs on the daily or supplemental calendar

Day 135 – Wednesday, May 24, 2023:

Last day for Senate to consider all Bills and JRs on 2nd and 3rd reading

House copies of the Conference Committee Report on the general appropriations bill must be distributed (48-hour layout)

Senate copies of CCRs on bills other than tax, general appropriations, and reapportionment bills must be printed and distributed (24-hour layout)

Day 139 - Sunday, May 28, 2023:

Last day for House to adopt CCRs or discharge House conferees and concur in Senate amendments

Last day for Senate to concur in House amendments or adopt CCRs

Day 140 - Monday, May 29, 2023: 88th Legislative Session Ends (Sine Die)

Additional Notes:

Abbreviations used above: HB: House Bill; SB: Senate Bill; HJR: House Joint Resolution; SJR: Senate Joint Resolution; and CCR: Conference Committee Report

The Governor must sign or veto legislation within 10 days of transmittal (excluding Sunday), or it becomes law without his/her signature. For legislation transmitted with less than 10 days in the legislative session, the governor has 20 days after adjournment to act, or the legislation becomes law without being signed.

4 - Caring for Voting Americans











The dictionary donation is a perfect example of the community supporting our Board Outcome Goals, one of which is to continually increase the number of 3rd graders reading at or above grade level.



Dear Golden Triangle Republican Women,


Thank you for the opportunity to represent you and our shared values in the Texas Legislature. I was very excited when parts of Jefferson County were added to Senate District 3 as result of redistricting. You can be sure that with Senator Brandon Creighton and Speaker Dade Phelan also representing Jefferson County, you will be well represented in the 88th Legislative Session.

I have always said Republican Women are the "wind in the sails of conservative government." What you and your membership set your minds to, you go out and achieve. So I'd like to share with you my commitment to work on the following and ask for your input regarding other issues which deserve attention.

- 1 <u>Property Taxes</u>. We will enter the 88th Legislative Session with a significant budget surplus due to unprecedented federal stimulus and high inflation driving up the state's sales tax revenues. I will always remember that these are <u>your</u> tax dollars that <u>you</u> worked to earn. I am committed to returning as much as we can through substantial property tax relief. Earlier this year, Texans voted overwhelmingly to increase the school district homestead exemption from \$25,000 to \$40,000. I will absolutely support measures to further reduce property taxes.
- 2 Border Security and Law Enforcement Officers. Because the federal government is failing to address border security, I also believe Texas should continue to support our law enforcement officers. Texas' investment in border security has now reached nearly \$4.4 billion for Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023. These funds support the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Military Department, as well as other state agencies and local law enforcement officers through grants.

But there are still thousands of people pouring into Texas every day. Since Governor Greg Abbott launched Operation Lone Star in March of 2021, DPS has seized more than 354 million lethal doses of fentanyl. That's enough to kill every Texan 10 times! These men and women who place their lives on the line deserve our thanks and support.

3 - Election Security. We will also be looking at ways to further secure our elections. I am absolutely thrilled that Governor Abbott has chosen a colleague of mine, Senator Jane Nelson, to be our next Secretary of State. I know she is committed to fair elections with accurate and timely results. She has a lifelong commitment to public service and a deep understanding of state government due to her chairing the Senate Finance Committee for the last seven years. As I said earlier, when Republican Women take on a task, they do it the right way!



One of the highlights of each Legislative Session is when members of the Texas Federation of Republican Women come to the Capitol. As TFRW's largest organization, Golden Triangle Republican Women provides the avenue for so many women in your area to influence policy, develop candidates and elect the leaders of Texas. I thank GTRW for furnishing the structure and support for political activists to learn, engage and flourish. And I look forward to seeing you in Austin February 3rd.


